



Secondly, this is related to research question number two describing about the similarities and differences of suggestions used by men (Peter and Edmund) and women (Susan and Lucy) main characters. The researcher found four similarities of suggestion strategy that men (Peter and Edmund) and women (Susan and Lucy) used in making suggestion. The similarities are Imperative, Negative Imperative, Specific Formulae (Interrogative Form), and Hints strategy. While, there are two different suggestion strategies, included Possibility/Probability and Conditional, which were only used by woman (Susan and Lucy) main characters. These different strategies were caused by the relation between interlocutors, age and gender.

Men main characters more use this strategy than women main characters. The use of imperative by men usually use the word like *idiot* or say his interlocutors. While the use of imperative by women sometimes is different and not like imperative as in the word *that's enough*. This is because they should choose appropriate linguistic forms to express suggestion to their interlocutor based on the context and the relationship between participants. Then, men and women main characters also use specific formulae to express suggestion, but women more use variation of this strategy than men. It is like the use of tag question. Women use tag question in making suggestion because woman want to minimize offence that may appear and to show more polite.
